

The Holly Grove Senior Citizens Club met Wednesday, September 19, 2018 with 16 members present.

Minnie Conrad presented a devotional called Reverence for Age. Carolina Conrad read a poem called The Golden Age, with which we all could identify with and gave us a few smiles.

Carolina presented the guest speaker for this month, Brittany Clodfelter, PT, DPT from Accelerate Therapy and Performance in Lexington. Accelerate also has an office in Salisbury.

Brittany led us in a Balance and Dizziness Workshop. She explained how we may not realize we have balance issues but they sneak up on us. When balance problems develop they can increase the risk for falling, shorten our attention span, disrupt our normal sleep patterns and cause excessive fatigue.

Brittany explained that balance issues and be treated successfully with balance specific activities, gait re-education, strengthening and endurance exercises, including posture re-training and also occulomotor exercises involving eye, head and body movements.

Accelerate Therapy and Performance offered each of our members a free 20 minute balance assessment, which many of us are very interested in. Brittany's program was very interesting and information.

Before our refreshments we recited the Lord's Prayer and then expressed cares and concerns for our community.

The Treasury Report was given by Myra Beck.

Worship bloopers

"This is not a performance," I always tell the nervous 3rd-grader in the parish the first time they go to light the candles on a Sunday morning right there in front of Momma and Aunt Maggie and the grouchy altar guild lady and God and everybody. "It's worship, and we aren't perfect, nor are we supposed to be. We give God and God's people our best, but when we fall short, God does the rest." Luther's Sacristy Prayer essentially says the same thing. "Were it all up to me, I would bring it all to destruction." Yep. We have this treasure in earthen vessels.

I lead worship all over the place. I've preached and led worship in at least 10 states and at least 10 countries. I've been a pastor of a small rural, large urban, and university/resort congregations. I've preached for 10,000 people at one time and I've preached for hundreds of thousands on DayOne radio show. And I've messed up so many times that it's hard to believe I didn't at some point just give it up. It's one thing to make a defective widget every now and then. It's quite another horrifying reality to blunder the Word and/or sacraments! My strongest recurring tendencies toward works righteousness are in these humbling moments.

A pastor in our synod whom I know reasonably well was lamenting on social media having forgotten the words to the Lord's Prayer during a pastoral visit in a care facility. What pastor hasn't done that? My intern supervisor turned all red in the face once and finally had to walk down from the altar because he couldn't even remember how the Lord's Prayer started! A pastor with whom I worked preached a whole sermon on how "Mary washed Jesus' hair with her feet." That's just an image you can't unsee. Another pastoral colleague got up to lead the Creed and entirely omitted the first article. No creation! An intern once meant to pray "for the hungry and the homeless," but it came out, "for the hungry and the homely." He quickly recovered by adding, "And Lord, we pray for all of the good looking people, too."

Among my own personal pastoral worship leadership and preaching blunders are:

- First time ever, distributing the wine in my first-year-teaching parish at St. Paul's in Stoverstown, PA, my Mom and Dad had just given me a big pewter
 cross to wear, which I did, not realizing the physics of how when you bend over, the cross swings forward with force, which it did, dinging an elderly
 woman right in the mouth and breaking the top middle tooth of her dentures clean in half. Neither she nor I ever told my supervisor. I was horrified.
- Same parish, same semester, only Easter, and sundresses were all the rage, and my supervisor reminded me to be discreet, and as I handed out wafers on one side at the altar trying not to be creepy, I looked away and dropped a wafer right down the front of a dress. Moved on. Horrified.
- Unbeknownst to me, I scooped up several dozen wafers at the altar as I reached across the paten to pick up the chalice, and didn't know I had a sleeve
 full until I walked out to the nave level for distribution, and it was like manna raining from heaven, and I couldn't figure what happened.
- Preached a sermon on the 10 commandments in which I referred to the commandment, "You shall not admit adultery." Denied it. Heard it on the tape, though. Choir member's assessment: "Good advice, Pastor. But bad commandment."
- Finally got up the nerve to do footwashing on Maundy Thursday my fourth year in the parish, only to be so nervous in explaining it and issuing the invitation to come forward that I said, "All who desire may now remove your shoes and come forward for the fart-wushing." Lots of laughter, but not the Holy Week moment I was aiming for.
- A teenager at the third morning worship service at the communion rail looked up and said, "Pastor, you have on a brown loafer and a black loafer." I
 did. Probably dozens of others saw it. She alone was brave. I said, "I have another pair almost like it at home, only in reverse."

I could go on and on, as all pastors and anyone in any vocation could. We're far from perfect. I tell those stories to nervous acolytes and shaky seminarians and now to you to highlight that we have to be able to take ourselves seriously enough, but at the same time, not too seriously. I hope it's a little easier to light the candles that first time with every eye burning a hole in your back, assessing what kind of shoes you wear and if your hair looks right. "Hey," I remind acolytes, "until you knock out some lady's tooth, I'm way ahead of you in the worship-messing-up contest. But every now and then, God uses even me."

May God use you powerfully through the gift and calling of your baptism and Christ's presence in and through you despite all of the perfectly good and accurate excuses that we're not good enough and never will be.

Someone told me we are getting rid of the nursery. Is it true?! Don't we care about young families anymore?

Dear Mr./Mrs. Sitter,

Well, what you heard is partially true. The plan is to sometime soon transition away from having a volunteer from the congregation sit in the nursery during worship on Sunday. But we are in no way "getting rid" of the nursery. The nursery will continue to be there like it always has been for parents and little ones who need it during worship or any other time. But the fact is that our nursery workers have most often not been needed at all on Sunday mornings. One of two things almost always happens: the nursery worker sits in the nursery by herself all service (and yes, it is always *hers*elf- the men have been rather slack in this department), or the nursery worker is joined in the nursery by a young child *and* the child's parent. Maybe it's a culture change from 30 years ago, but it is quite rare for there to be a Sunday when parents have dropped children off in the nursery. So, rather than have the nursery worker twiddling her thumbs and not be in worship, we're going to give it a go at leaving the nursery unstaffed during worship. And actually this is precisely *because* we care about young families. It's mostly parents and grandparents of young children who volunteer to keep the nursery, and we'd rather give them the flexibility to participate in worship and share their gifts elsewhere in the service.

I know what you're thinking- but hey, what about those Sundays when somebody really does *need* the nursery? Well, there may be times when this still happens. Pastor Matt sometimes needs help with his kids when Keri is at work, and there is a family that visits a few times a year who use the nursery. This is where the community comes in. You can help by keeping your eyes open for situations when a nursery worker might be needed and help communicate that to someone who has been a recent nursery volunteer. I dare say they would still be willing to help when needed! It may be more disorganized, but right now a nursery worker is actually needed less than 10% of the time. And it seems better to weather a little disorganization than it does to waste 90% of our nursery volunteers' time. It's stewardship- stewardship of gifts and time!

We know that in times of disaster, we all want to help. Hurricane Florence took its own sweet time coming ashore and then moving across our synod and the Southeast. How can we respond in order to have the most impact?

Lutheran Services Carolinas (LSC) and Lutheran Disaster Response (LDR) are in the process of establishing longer-term relief efforts. For that matter, LDR is still on site on the Gulf Coast with Katrina recovery and definitely in Houston with Harvey recovery! You may feel called to give items in addition to money. Think about connections you might have with a congregation on the coast in need. Call them to see if there would be ways you can help them directly. Often the most helpful assistance comes through personal relationships. Continue to watch *Synod E-News* for new opportunities for giving as they come to our attention.

Additionally, I have contacted Catholic Charities of the Diocese of Raleigh by way of Bishop Zarama. They have a substantial infrastructure in place already for distribution. Read below to see how we can join in their work.

Red Cross personnel are now deployed to respond to needs in the affected area, requiring that blood drives across the state be canceled



for the foreseeable future. And yet, there is a real need for donated blood. Contact the Red Cross in your area to find out where to give blood to help.

Collect these items

Living into our agreement of the Declaration Along the Way, Bishop Tim contacted Bishop Zarama about how we might respond. Catholic Charities of the Diocese of Raleigh has a substantial infrastructure for distribution of items and they have welcomed our help. They are currently collecting:



- Baby diapers--all sizes (18-36 mos. sizes are the greatest demand)
- Baby formula (definitely formula, NOT food)
- Baby wipes
- Feminine hygiene products (sanitary pads, tampons)
- Adult diapers
- Bottled water (pints, liters, 1-gallon, or 3-gallon containers)

WHAT NOT TO DO:

Please do NOT bring items to the synod office. We do not have a way to store them nor do we have a way to transport them. Send or deliver them directly to Raleigh. Also, please do NOT collect clothes. Those often become a second disaster for those recovering as they must be stored, sorted, or even cleaned. These specifically-requested items or monetary donations are the best way to give!
