#### The Meaning of Being a Mother.....

The meaning of being a mother is virtually endless. A mother is a protector, disciplinarian and friend. A mother is a selfless, loving human who must sacrifice many of their wants and needs for the wants and needs of their children. A mother works hard to make sure their child is equipped with the knowledge, skills and abilities to make it as a competent human being. Being a mother is perhaps the hardest, most rewarding job a woman will ever experience.

#### Unconditional Love

From the day they are born, a child will test your patience. No matter what they do or say, being a mother means you will love your child unconditionally. Children who receive love and attention from their mother are less likely later on to fall in love with someone who offers love conditionally, whether with behavior control or abuse. Show your child how much you love them with hugs and kisses. Listen to your child as they recount their day, play games or slip a note in their lunch box letting them know how much you love them (Ref 1).

#### Safety and Security

When a woman becomes pregnant, it is her responsibility to provide a safe and secure environment while her baby grows. This responsibility continues once she becomes a mother, whether it's ensuring her child has a roof over its head to keeping monsters away at night and everything in between. Providing your child with a safe and secure environment protects them from abuse and harm as well as help boost their child's mental and emotional development. Provide a safe, healthy environment for children by reducing risks and stress as well as keeping an eye out on children (Ref 2).

#### Teacher and Disciplinarian

Being a mother means being there to teach your child important rules and roles of life, from being an empathetic human being to learning how to be responsible of one's actions. As your child grows up, they are going to face an onslaught of differing thoughts, opinions and values from their friends, the movies, internet, television and magazines. A mother will help guide their child to figure out their goals and values in life as well as teach them the importance of an education, manners and more. A mother will also discipline their child, a skill that will benefit children throughout their life as well as at school, work and life at home (Ref 3 and 4).






Some people believed that if you got up on May 1st and washed your face in the May dew, it would remove all freckles and pimples, giving you a great complexion.

For the women who struggle with fertility, for those women whom society labels as less in their childlessness, for those women who have lost children.


For their tears, for their strength, for their wisdom, for their lives, we thank you.

#### A Different Easter Season

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Amid this Easter season like none other in my lifetime I want to share with you something I came across a few years ago. It references the disciplines of Lent: prayer, fasting, and almsgiving while pointing toward the Passion and what follows.

Love as strong as death

Consider an oddity about the great flu pandemic of 1918-1919. It happened ... a century ago, hard on the heels of the end of World War I. That war killed a staggering 20 million people, yet the flu pandemic was so widespread and catastrophic that some estimate it killed over 100 million. Whole populations were wiped out forever. The great writers of the '20s — Hemingway, Fitzgerald and others — wrote about the futility of war and the Lost Generation that sought to recover from that calamity, yet these same writers ignored the flu pandemic. It does not appear in the literature of the period. It is as if it never happened, even though it was far more devastating. Perhaps it was the sort of senseless, pervasive death that could not be fought, that was immune to heroism or cowardice.

In the face of unavoidable death, in the recognition that time seems to chew up mountains and continents, as well as our lives, Jesus gives us something to hold on to that lasts: love — love expressed to God in prayer and fasting and to the world in almsgiving. Yes, we will die. But we are called to live abundantly and love extravagantly. As it says in the Song of Solomon, "... love is strong as death, passion fierce as the grave" (Song of Solomon 8:6).

Easter is about that love, that passion. In fact, it is a greater love for it is *stronger than death*. Passion is a word that takes its very existence from Jesus' suffering and death on the cross. When you look up the origins of the word "passion" you find that it came into English in the 12th century to describe Jesus' sacrifice. Further back into Old English and Latin it described suffering. Over the centuries it has come to designate any extremely strong

emotion. It is also sometimes applied to the object of one's love; for example, "his passion for music." We may say that "she is passionate about her job" (or family or health). Like the word "love" however, the term has perhaps lost some of its power by overuse.

We did not have our regular services, but Passion Sunday ends Lent and opens Holy Week to focus on Jesus' passion. We observe Maundy Thursday which name comes from the commandment to **love** one another as Jesus loved. Good Friday reveals the strength of that love as Jesus stretches out his arms to die for us. Easter morning we see the fruition of that love in the resurrection!

Amid this new pandemic it may be hard to recall that joyous Easter feeling. However, this time will pass, and we will adjust. Perhaps this season is a time to extend our Lenten disciplines as we are facing new challenges. It is certainly a time for prayer as we see so many people whose lives have been turned upside down and so many who are working to ease the suffering of the sick and find treatments and a vaccine. It is also a time for a strange kind of fasting as we give up time with friends and family and adjust to empty store shelves. There is a need too for almsgiving as so many face losses of income or jobs while charities and churches face financial challenges as well.

But we live in hope and faith that solutions will be found and that we will find a new normal. What stays the same is God's love and our calling as the church to show that love to a broken world. How we do that may change but the call to live passionately for Jesus will not change. Read the closing words of the quote: "Yes, we will die. But we are called to live abundantly and love extravagantly." Luther once said that contrary to what we think, "...life comes in the midst of death" rather than the other way round. From the day we are born we are dying. What matters is how we live on that journey. Even in this chaotic time let us live passionately for the Lord.
